

## PUPIL PREMIUM UPDATE

## August 2021

## WESTLANDS ACADEMY

The Pupil Premium is designed to ensure that funding to tackle disadvantaged students reaches those who need it most and has a positive impact upon narrowing the outcome gaps. The funding is allocated to Local Authorities and schools with students from Early Years to Year 11 who are looked after, have parents currently in the Armed Forces or are eligible for free school meals (FSM), including those eligible for FSM at any point in their childhood.

The Government does not prescribe how pupil premium should be spent, believing that schools are in the best position to decide - on the basis of available evidence of what works well elsewhere - the appropriate strategies in their particular circumstances. This report highlights how the funding will be used during the academic year 2020-2021.

The proportion of disadvantaged students, those supported by pupil premium at Westlands Academy is much higher than average, with 66 students (80%) of the cohort classed as disadvantaged.

One student did not achieve a qualification in mathematics in August 2021. Everyone did in English.

Breakfast Club	£1 500	To ensure that students have eaten before they start learning. To provide a welcoming and calm start to the morning and, if required students can talk to staff about any issues that are concerning them in a more informal setting.	
PSA / Safeguarding Lead support	£7 000	Students and families require extra support to help them overcome their individual barriers and develop strategies to enhance school engagement and attendance. To provide clear support for families to engage students. This support has been crucial throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, especially when families have been spending a large amount of time together To provide school support for our students and families when they require it.
