



Summer School Funding

The summer schools programme was set up in response to the impact that the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic had on students learning. The aim of the summer schools programme was to provide students with academic education and enrichment activities in order to mitigate the impact of lost learning, particularly with regard to social interaction and literacy.

At Westlands Academy, we aimed to ensure that our summer school programme was used by the students who would benefit most. In addition to providing support with English and maths, the funding was used to improve our summer school programme, which offered an opportunity for students to enhance their learning and wellbeing through a range of activities, including team building, gardening, arts and craft and out of school activities in the form of Outdoor education.

As a school we were also mindful of the fact that all students, including the Year 6 pupils, had not been able to access the school site in the usual way and had not experienced the full Westlands offer. Therefore, we offered places on the programme to all accepted Year 6 pupils as well as Westlands KS3. By accessing the summer school, we believed students would be better supported to develop their confidence and independence skills, as well as help them to navigate the school site ahead of when the school returned to 'normal' in the next academic year. It was also felt that, in some cases, attendance at the summer school would support family and home issues.

Difficulties encountered

Due to the ongoing concerns relating to COVID-19, it was difficult to predict how many staff would be available to support the programme. This meant increasing the staffing ratio to ensure that if a member of staff was absent that there would still be sufficient staff to support students and deliver activities. Some staff were asked to isolate at short notice and this meant changing.

Some students wold not ultimately engage with the summer school but staff did work with parents and offered support. Some students were also asked to isolate during the later days of the summer school.

Some parents and carers were unable to transport their child to school during the week long programme. Whilst the vast majority of children and young people with an EHC Plan are entitled to home-to-school transport, the local authority were not able to provide this due to existing contracts with transport firms. As a school we made the decision to offer transport to those families that needed it. Therefore, staff were needed at the start and end of the day, once the programme had finished.
